

JUBILEE OF FAMILIES 2015



"Christian families make the threshold of their homes a great sign of the Door of mercy and welcome of God."—Pope Francis, Audience 11.18.15

The Jubilee of Families, one of the moments of the year-long Jubilee of Mercy, will take place this Sunday December 27, 2015, the feast of the Holy Family. Below are resources and suggestions for your family on the Jubilee day or any time during the Jubilee year.

Resources from the Vatican

The Pontifical Council for the Family has prepared a brief resource for families to use together when they enter through the Holy Door in their diocese. The resource includes quotes from Pope Francis's *Bull of Indiction of the Extraordinary Jubilee of Mercy* for families to reflect on. It also provides an opportunity for the family to express their gratitude for each other, invites family members to offer and seek forgiveness from each other, and finishes with a family commitment to serve the poor when returning home. (Note that this ritual could be used by families or other groups at any point during the Jubilee of Mercy.)

Resources from the USCCB

- Go to confession as a family.
- Pray together one of the great penitential psalms, like Psalm 51 or Psalm 143.
- Learn together about the corporal and spiritualworks of mercy. Discuss as a family which works of mercy are the most difficult, the most appealing, etc. Together, decide as a family on one work of mercy to try to do together during the Jubilee of Mercy.
- Read together the monthly Meditations On Mercyprovided by the USCCB.
- Set aside a time for each family member to seek and receive forgiveness from another family member(s). Pope Francis calls the word "I'm sorry" one of the three "magic words" in a family's life (along with "thank you" and "may I");
- Often relationships in the family are in need of reconciliation. Spend time in prayer for a relationship that needs forgiveness and healing, asking the Holy Spirit for insight on how best to reconcile with that person.
- Read together the article about forgiveness in the family on this link *http://www.foryourmarriage.org/forgiveness-healing-the-hurts-in-marriage/*, and discuss what you learned from it.

SUNDAY READINGS AND BACKGROUNDS THE HOLY FAMILY OF JESUS, MARY, AND JOSEPH

In response to Pope Francis' urgent call to the new evangelization and his challenge to families to love according to Gospel values, each week in the bulletin our parish will offer a great opportunity to involve the entire family. There will be a short explanation of the three reading with possible questions to help us reflect on and apply the Gospel message to our lives. There are suggested questions for children, the youth and adults. May this parish endeavor help all of us deepen our relationship with the Lord.

Reading 1 Sirach 3:2-6, 12-14 Show reverence for God by honoring your parents.

Whether we are five, or fifteen, or thirty-five years old, the Lord expects us to show respect for our parents. A mother or father shares in God's work of teaching, guiding, and caring for us. We honor our mothers and fathers and guardians by obeying them in all reasonable ways, and by comforting and caring for them when they are in need. Those who honor their parents will be richly rewarded.

In what ways do we need to "put on love"? How will you "be thankful"? How might your actions affect others around you?

Reading 2 *Colossians 3:12-21* Serve the Lord by loving one another.

How can families and Christian communities live together in peace? The letter to the Colossians today offers helpful advice. We should "put on" in compassion and kindness. We must be willing to forgive, no matter how many times a parent or brother or sister offends us, just as the Lord forgives us without limit. Over all other virtues we "put on love." When we allow ourselves to be truly loving, gratitude and joy overflow in our lives.

What do we learn about Jesus in this story? How can you put God first in your life? Jesus understood his relationship with God. It enabled him to grow "in wisdom and age and grace." How do you think following Jesus' advice will help you in your family life?

Gospel <u>Luke 2:41-52</u> The boy Jesus stays behind in the Temple.

Can you identify with Jesus in this wonderful story from Luke's Gospel? Jesus at the age of twelve is on the verge of becoming a man in the Jewish society of his day. He and his parents have traveled to Jerusalem to celebrate the Passover. After the departure of Mary and Joseph, Jesus remains behind in the Temple. There he amazes the religious teachers with his wisdom and intelligence.

When Jesus' parents discover him missing, they are upset. Jesus explains the importance of putting God first in our lives. When we do this, everything else in life will fall into place.

Theme: Jesus establishes his obedience to and relationship with God the Father.

Breaking Open the Word

Suggested text for faith sharing: Today's Gospel

Step One: Listen to the Word

As you hear this reading, what words or phrases strike you? What in this reading touches your heart? What lingers in your memory?

Step Two: Look into Your Life

Question for Children: Why is it important to obey our parents?

Why is it important to obey God?

Question for Youth: Jesus was obedient to his parents, even though he was the Son of God. Why is obedience so important?

Is it something you struggle with?

Question for Adults: How are you, too, called to our Father's house?
